 - a. Working with Community school program & MMSD to implement
 - b. It is difficult to implement and maintain recycling programs
 - c. Will start simple at Leopold with recycling milk containers in the cafeteria
 - d. Another future opportunity is the compostable tray
 - i. These can be recycled if not much residue
 - e. If successful can expand the recycling program

Race to Equity Project

- 1. What is the Race to Equity Project?
 - Initially launched by the Wisconsin Council on Children and Families in 2012 as a Project of Kids Forward
 - b. Purpose is to reduce racial disparities in Dane County through data collection, data analysis, tracking and dissemination, and advocacy
 - c. Dane County is often considered one of the best places to live, however, many reports conflict with this in terms of racial disparities being bigger than the national averages
 - d. This year the project has expanded statewide

Principal Update

- 1. Budget allocations for the next school year
 - a. Same number of allocations for classroom teachers
 - b. Specials: no change in allocation (music, gym, art, reach, etc)
 - c. Student services: psych, nursing, PBS, etc similar, slightly less psych
 - d. Drop in Title 1 Funding because of increased needs at other schools (this is a shared pot of money in the school district) drop of \$50,000
 - e. There will be a second assistant principal next year

- f. There has been a significant increase in the last year and half in students with needs (academic and social)
- g. Interventionist roles: added an additional 1.0 for Leopold
